The course 'WAR STUDIES: UNDERSTANDING MODERN WARS AND WARFARE' combines two sub-disciplines of IR – Security Studies and Strategic Studies – in order to pursue two objectives.

It first aims at explaining the causes of the international wars occurring in the contemporary international order. It also sheds light on the methods and modalities used to wage these wars and the political and normative environment within which they are embedded.

In doing so, the course focuses on the traditional military dimension of security, thus postulating an underlying continuity of today's world with earlier eras. The underlying cognitive interest is nevertheless critical of the dominating discourses held by politicians & media and recommendations made by experts.
